



Based on Dr. Joan Doe’s passion to support students pursuing a career in speech pathology, proposed below are three endowments that will create a lasting impact on the department for decades to come. The figures below were selected based on Dr. Doe’s interests in specific funding levels on an annual basis.

Joan Doe Award for Clinical Excellence

The Joan Doe Award for Clinical Excellence will be awarded annually in honor of Dr. Joan Doe to a first-year graduate student in the Communication Sciences and Disorders Program. The UGA Speech and Hearing Clinic faculty will nominate candidates and will select the recipient(s) based on demonstrated excellence in clinical, academic, and professional performance. The recipients(s) will receive a \$2,000 scholarship, a framed certificate of recognition, and his or her name will be engraved on a plaque located in the Speech and Hearing Clinic.

An initial investment of \$50,000 will provide \$2,000 each year.

Jane H. Doe Award for Clinical Achievement

The Jane H. Doe Award for Clinical Achievement will be awarded annually in honor of Jane Doe, previous clinic coordinator, to a second-year graduate student in the Communication Sciences and Disorders Program. The UGA Speech and Hearing Clinic faculty will nominate candidates and will select the recipient who has demonstrated excellence in academic and clinical performance, commitment to the department, and involvement in professional and service organizations. The recipient will exemplify qualities for potential as an outstanding contributor to the profession of speech-language pathology. The recipient(s) will receive a \$2,000 scholarship, a framed certificate of recognition, and his or her name will be engraved on a plaque located in the Speech and Hearing Clinic.

An initial investment of \$50,000 will provide \$2,000 each year.

The Georgia Speech-Language Pathology Recruitment Fund

The Georgia Recruitment Fund will be used for the purposes of recruiting top-caliber students into the University of Georgia’s speech-language pathology master’s degree program. As part of the admission and recruiting process each year, one or more new master’s student(s) will be selected to receive an award, which will be applied toward tuition and fees during the first year of the master’s program. Award criteria will require demonstrated academic excellence plus the potential for outstanding clinical and professional contributions. The recipient(s) will receive up to \$5,000 per year.

An initial investment of \$125,000 will provide \$5,000 each year.

An initial investment of \$100,000 will provide \$4,000 each year.

Award criteria will require demonstrated academic excellence plus the potential for outstanding clinical and professional contributions. The recipient(s) will receive up to \$5,000 per year.

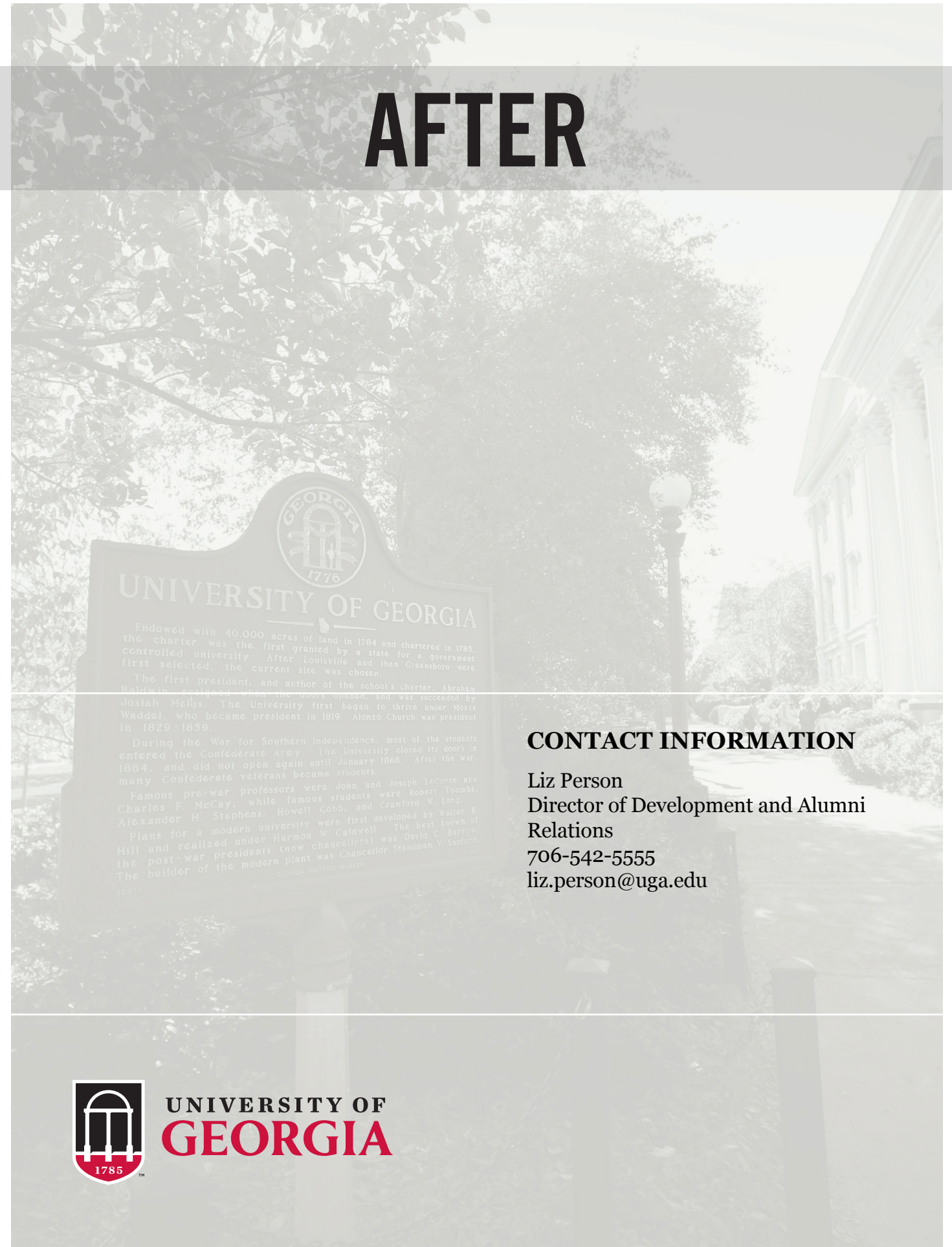

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

Endowed with 40,000 acres of land in 1784 and chartered in 1785, the charter was the first granted by a state for a government controlled university. After Louisville and then Greensboro were first selected, the current site was chosen.

The first president, and author of the school's charter, Abraham Baldwin, resigned when the doors opened, and was succeeded by Josiah Meigs. The University first began to thrive under Moses Waddel, who became president in 1819. Alonzo Church was president in 1829-1839.

During the War for Southern Independence, most of the students entered the Confederate Army. The University closed its doors in 1864, and did not open again until January 1866. After the war, many Confederate veterans became students.

Famous pre-war professors were John and Joseph LeConte and Charles F. McCay, while famous students were Robert Toombs, Alexander H. Stephens, Howell Cobb, and Crawford W. Long.

Plans for a modern university were first developed by Walter B. Hill and realized under Harmon W. Caldwell. The best known of the post-war presidents (now chancellors) was David C. Barrow. The builder of the modern plant was Chancellor Steadman V. Sanford.
